Dear parishioners,

A Spirit of Sharing

In today's Gospel we hear the story of the multiplication of the loaves of bread and fish by Jesus to feed the hungry crowd. Some commentators say that the real miracle here is not Jesus' ability to multiply loaves and fishes, but his ability to get people to share what little food they had. Thus, towards the end of Matthew's Gospel, we hear Jesus tell his disciples that the real mark of Christian discipleship is to be alert to the needs of people around us and to be willing to do something about it. The Gospel today encourages us not to be afraid to bring out the little bushel of flour, or the tiny loaves of bread or fish, but to have a readiness of mind and tenderness of heart to share with others whatever we have.

Here is a beautiful story

One day a village woman was surprised to find a well-dressed stranger at her door asking for something to eat. "I'm sorry" she said, "But I've nothing in the house right now." "Don't worry," said the stranger, "I have a soup stone in my bag; if you will let me put it in a pot of boiling water, I'll make the most delicious soup in the world. A large pot please."

The woman gave him a pot and he filled it with water and put it on fire. The woman quickly whispered the secret of the soup pot to her neighbor and very soon the word spread around in the village and they all came around to witness this work of the stranger and his soup stone. When the water began to boil, the stranger tasted a spoonful and exclaimed, "Hmmm!! Very tasty! All it needs is some potatoes." "I have some potatoes at home" shouted one woman; and in a few minutes ran home and brought a large quantity of sliced potatoes, which were placed in the pot. Then the stranger tasted the brew again. "Excellent" he said, adding, "If we only had some meat, this would be a tasty stew." Another housewife rushed home and brought some meat which was put into the pot. Then tasting it again, the stranger rolled up his eyes and said, "Delicious!! If only we had some vegetables, it would be perfect." One of the neighbors rushed home and brought a basket of carrots and onions. After these were put in, the stranger tasted the mixture, and in a voice of command said, "Salt and sauce." "Right here," said the housewife. Then came another command, "Bowls for everyone." People rushed to their homes in search of bowls. Some even brought back some bread and fruits.

Then they all sat down to a really delicious meal while the stranger handed out large helpings of his incredible soup. Everyone felt strangely happy as they laughed and talked and shared their very first common meal. In the middle of their merriment the stranger slipped away, leaving behind his miraculous soup stone, which they used anytime they wanted to make the loveliest soup in the world.

When we are able to bring together our talents and resources we provide an atmosphere of joy, and laughter. When we jealously protect our own turfs, we experience a lot of insecurity and threats from those that surround us and life can be really "iffy" and jittery. Jesus is calling us to a life of joy, fulfillment in the presence of one another and joy in our ability to respond to one another even out of our "five loaves and two fishes." This is the true spirit of a Eucharistic people. God bless you all.

Faith First for Families

Sunday Gospel Reflections for July 31st.

Matthew 14:13-21

Gospel Summary - Jesus was still very sad about John the Baptist's death. But even in his sorrow, Jesus remembered the needs of others. As he tried to go to a deserted place, the crowds followed him in hopes that he would heal the sick, among them. When it was late and everyone was hungry, the disciples suggested that everyone go away and buy something to eat. Instead, Jesus told the disciples to give them something to eat. They brought five loaves of bread and two fish which turned out to be more than enough for the crowd.

Reflection for Families - How many times as parents are we presented with a crisis to resolve? The disciples presented a problem to Jesus and seemingly without effort he resolved it. One of our nation's great educators, Barbara Coloroso has a piece of advice: When children recognize they have a problem, the teacher or parent responds, "*You have a problem ...name it. What's your plan?*" We can help our children resolve their problems, but we should also be quick to point out that when God is involved, there is far more than enough.

Bringing the Gospel into your Family - At the very least, this Gospel today is about sharing. As you look around at your family's resources, you probably think you need everything you have. But look again. Try to find some things you can share with someone else and make plans to see that it happens. Maybe you have some toys, clothing, or household items you can give to someone else. Maybe you have time to visit with someone who is lonely. Maybe you have the health and energy to do a chore for someone who does not.

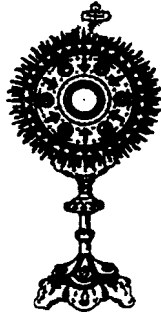

Why do Catholics do That?

Why do Catholics bless themselves before entering church and when leaving?

Old Testament Jews washed with water before entering the Temple precincts. Building on a ritual familiar to the Jews, John the Baptist used water to represent repentance of sin and purification.

So when we cross ourselves with holy water entering and leaving the church, we recall that history. But we also refer to our Baptism when the priest used water to symbolize the washing away of our sins and to protect us from evil.
